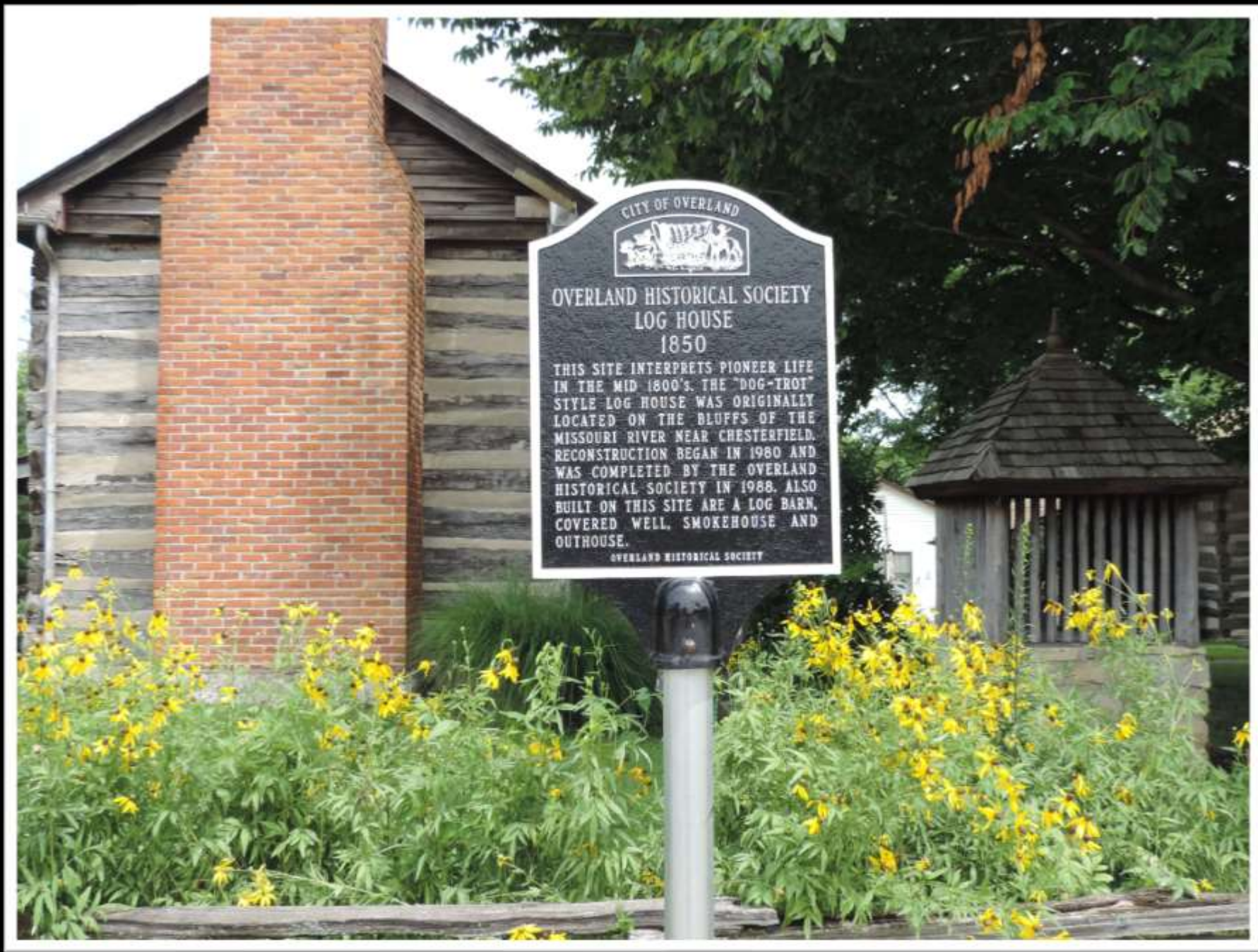

OVERLAND HISTORICAL SOCIETY
LOG HOUSE
1850

THIS SITE INTERPRETS PIONEER LIFE IN THE MID 1800'S. THE "DOG-TROT" STYLE LOG HOUSE WAS ORIGINALLY LOCATED ON THE BLUFFS OF THE MISSOURI RIVER NEAR CHESTERFIELD. RECONSTRUCTION BEGAN IN 1980 AND WAS COMPLETED BY THE OVERLAND HISTORICAL SOCIETY IN 1988. ALSO BUILT ON THIS SITE ARE A LOG BARN, COVERED WELL, SMOKEHOUSE AND OUTHOUSE.



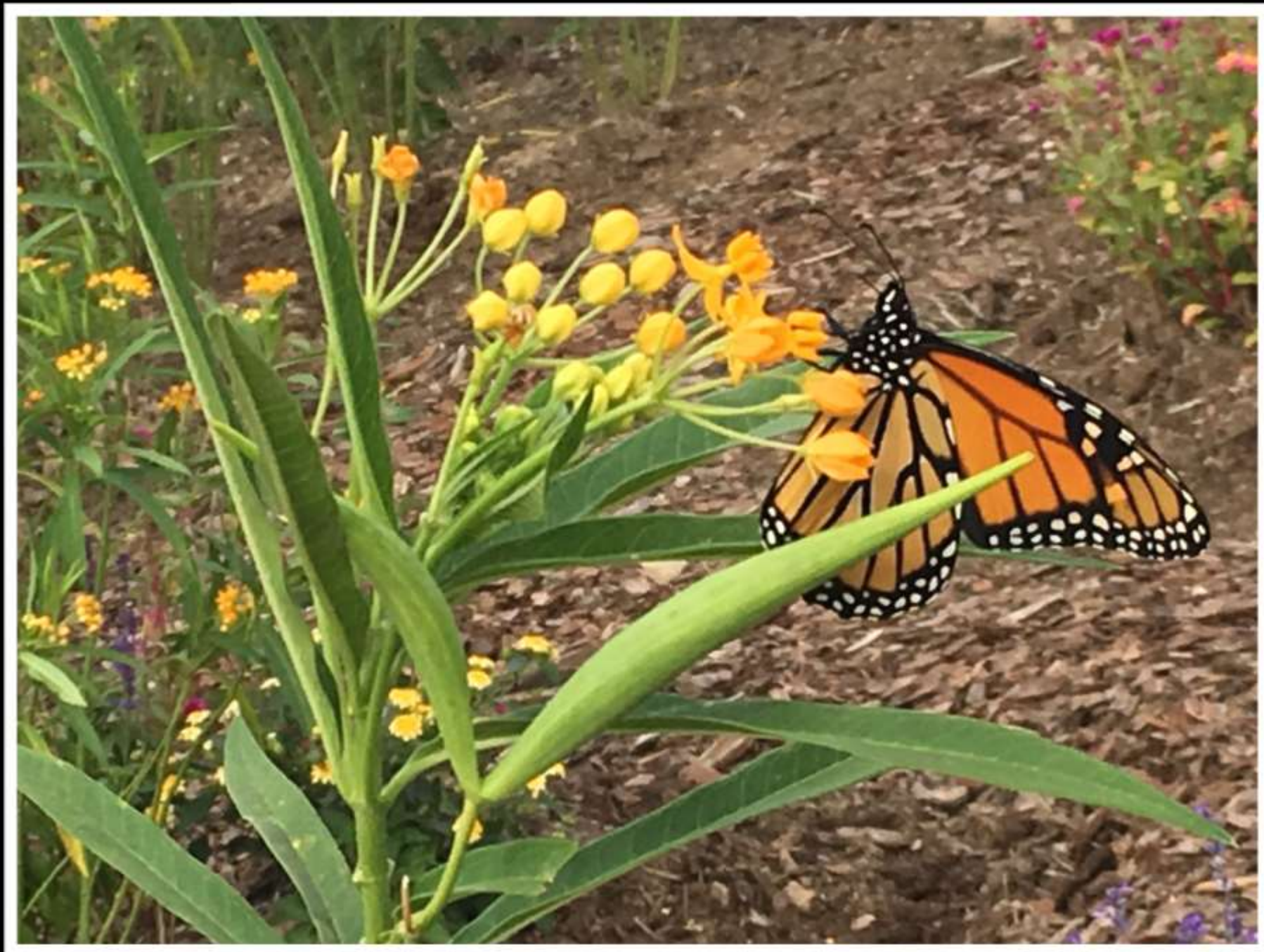



Overwintering habitat is degraded by:

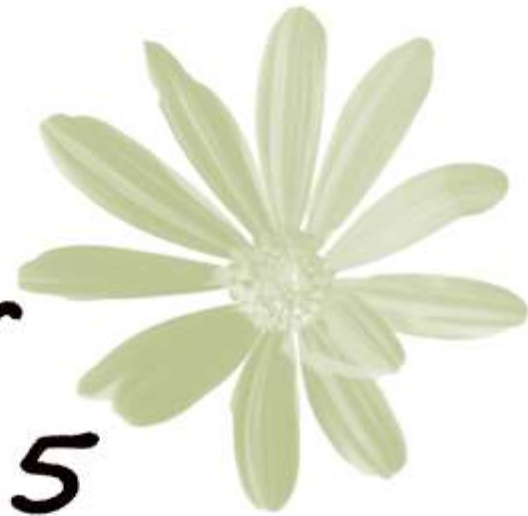
- Illegal logging

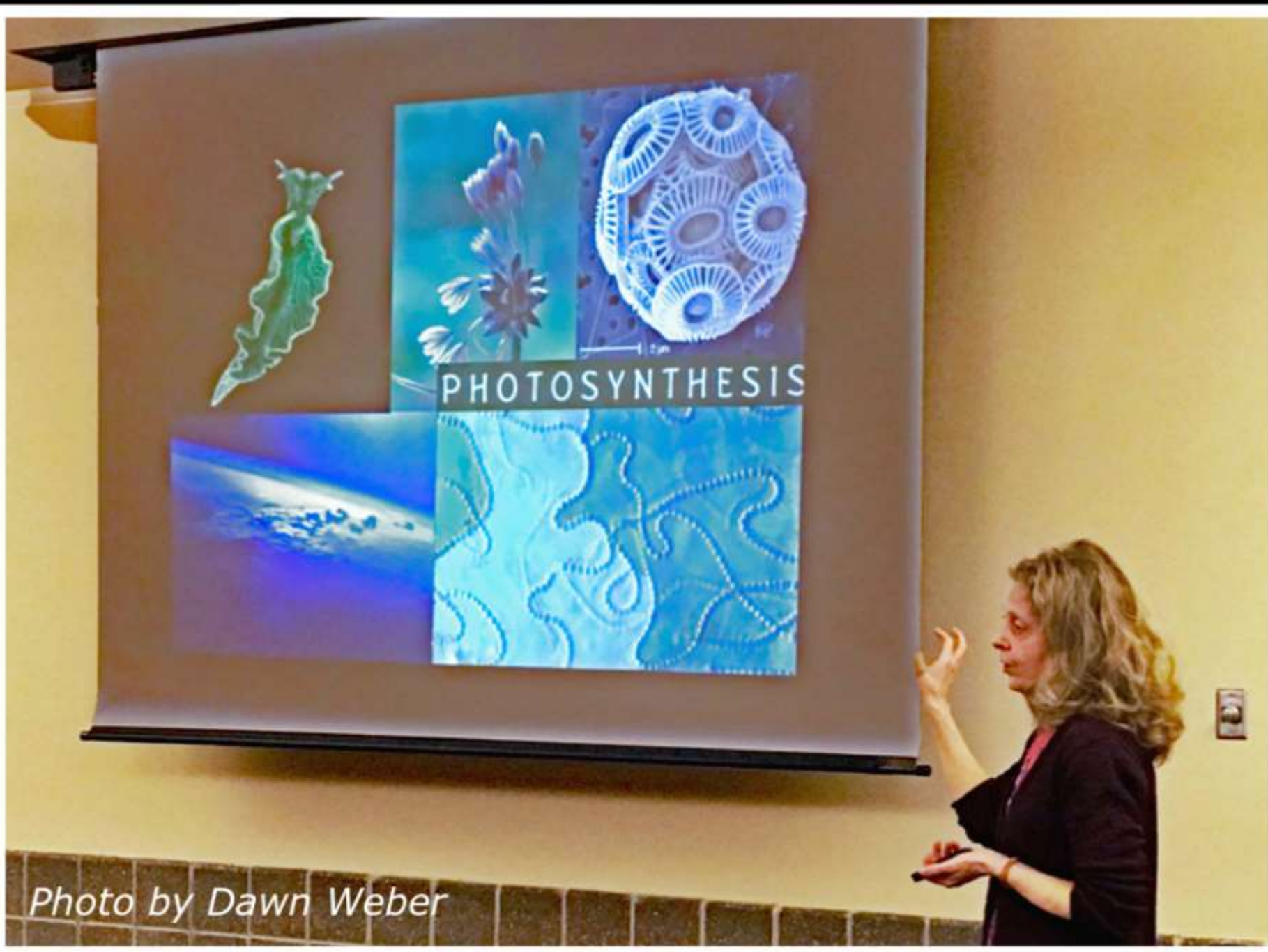

EXCEPT: CLEAR WHITE CEDAR

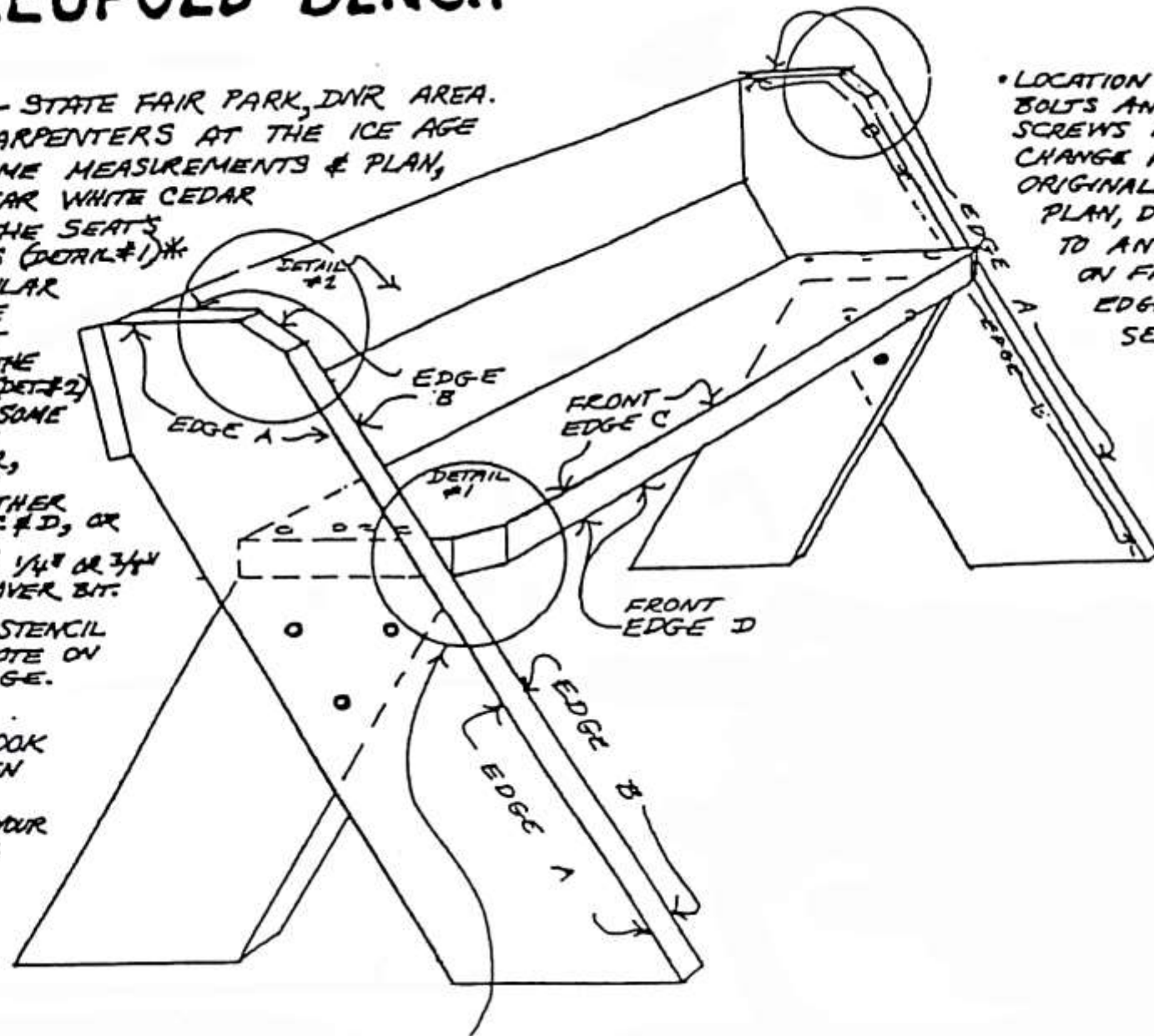
- ANGLE OFF THE SEAT'S
FRONT CORNERS (DETAIL #1)*

- DRAFT A SIMILAR
ANGLE ON THE
UPPER FRONT
CORNERS OF THE
LONGER LEGS (DET #2)

- IF YOU WANT SOME
OF THE EDGES
ROUNDED OVER,
DECIDE BEFORE
ASSEMBLY. EITHER
EDGES A, B, C & D, OR
EDGE A & C.
ROUT WITH A $\frac{1}{4}$ " OR $\frac{3}{8}$ "
ROUNDING-OVER BIT.

- WOODBURN, ROUT OR STENCIL
NAME, LOGO OR QUOTE ON
BACK OR SEAT-EDGE.
(ARLYNE ACASC)

- WATCH FOR THAT LOOK
OF RECOGNITION WHEN
SOMEONE ROUNDS A
CORNER AND SPOTS YOUR
BENCH — (SIGN OF A
KINDRED SPIRIT)

BOLTS AND
SCREWS MAY
CHANGE FROM
ORIGINAL
PLAN, DUE
TO ANGLE.
ON FRONT
EDGE OR
SEAT.





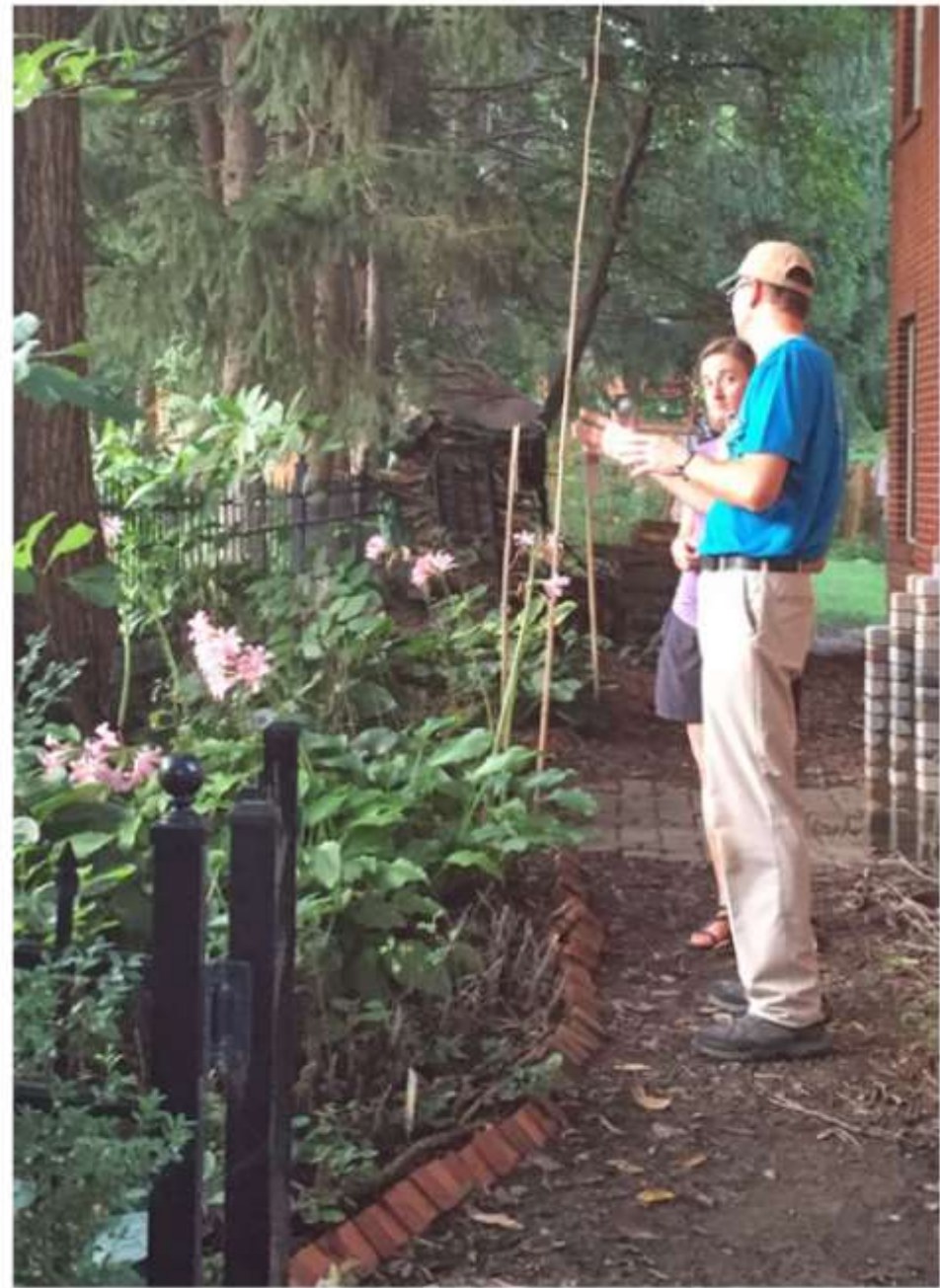

Certified and registered by Monarch Watch as an official Monarch Waystation.

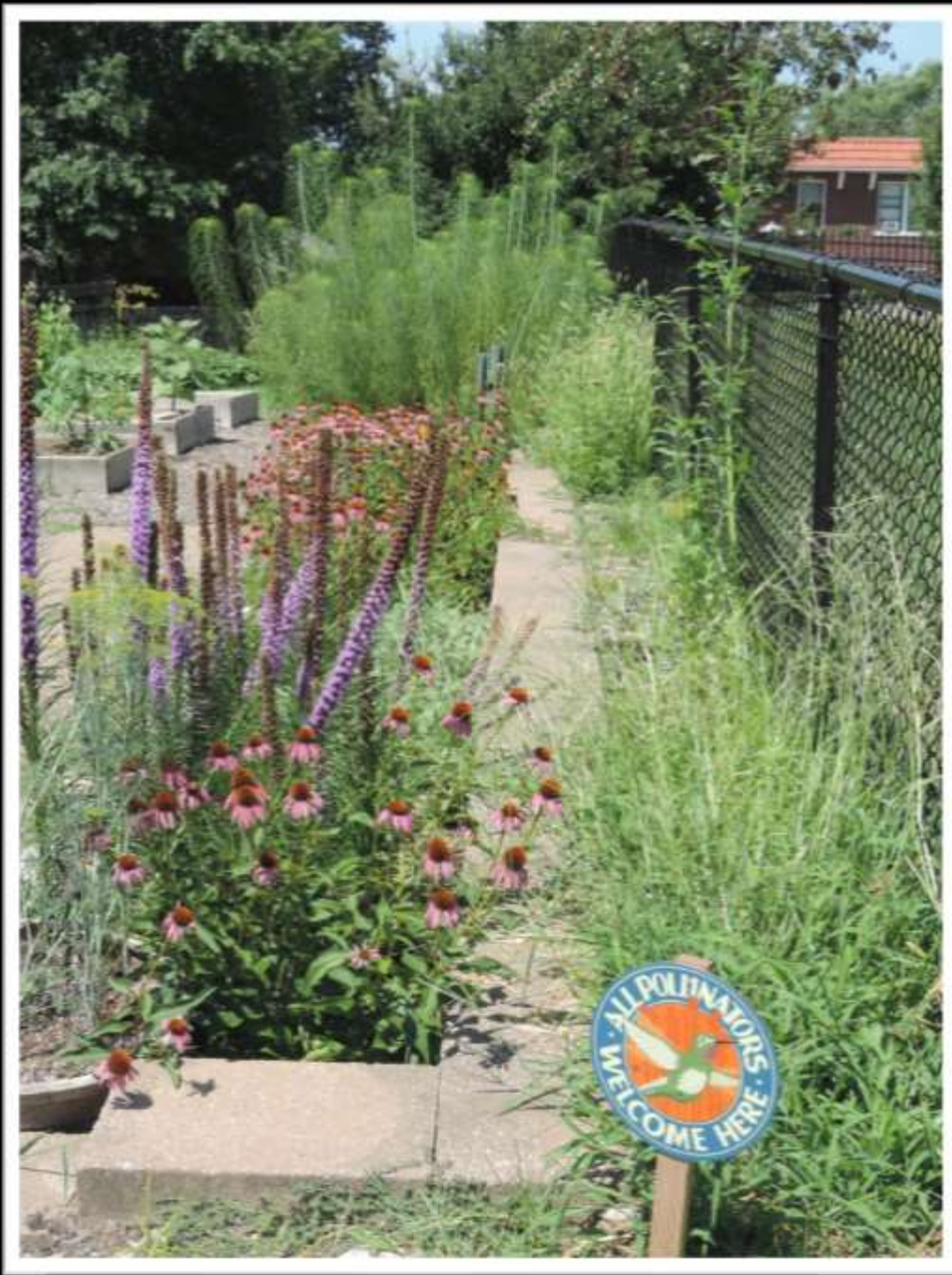
