The Partners for Native Landscaping come together each year to inspire and help individuals to create gardens that are not only beautiful but are also habitats for native wildlife. We ask you think about how you can apply what you learn in your own yard to your neighborhood and broader community. For example, consider one or more of these actions:

- Add more native plants to your front yard landscape to inspire your neighbors with its abundance of wildlife.
- Add informational signage to your landscape to describe the biodiversity on view.
- Reduce your turf by expanding your native landscapes.
- **Share what you learn** about native landscaping with your neighborhood organization and help create a native plant garden on public/common ground.
- Write an article and send it, with a photo from your yard, to your community newspaper; or invite a reporter to your yard.
- Engage your elected officials to incorporate native plants and practices in public spaces.


